





## **Budget Priorities**

#### **Initial Priorities**

- Statutory relief for transit agencies
- Funding for zero-emission buses and infrastructure, set-aside for transit agencies

#### Supplemental Priorities

- Additional funding for zero-emission vehicles and infrastructure
- Funding (or access to funding) to combat homelessness
- Funding for transit center/stop clean-up
- Funding for back to transit strategies / fare free transit
- Funding for UC ITS

## Statutory Relief for Transit Agencies

- Extension of AB 90 relief measures through FY 2022-23
  - Hold harmless, financial penalty waivers
- Extension of AB 107 relief measure through FY 2022-23
  - STA-SOGR flexibility
- New exclusions from "operating costs" for purposes of farebox recovery/efficiency criteria calculations
  - Includes exclusions for GASB 68/75, costs of security services and public safety contracts
- Authorizes federal funds to be counted as "local funds" for purposes of farebox recovery/efficiency criteria calculations
- Authorizes discounted/fare free transit to be counted at full retail value for purposes of farebox recovery
- 5-Year relief from farebox recovery/efficiency criteria calculations for agencies demonstrating local MOE
- Streamlining of TDA performance audits

## New Investments Benefitting Transit Agencies

- \$2.7 billion for a Zero-Emission Vehicles and Infrastructure.
  - \$499.5 million for Clean Trucks, Buses & Off-Road Freight
  - \$70 million for zero-emission transit buses (Set-Aside)
  - \$494.2 million for the Clean Transportation Program
  - \$29.7 million is for charging and refueling infrastructure for the deployment of zeroemission transit buses (Set-Aside)
  - \$407 million is for zero-emission rail and transit

## New Investments Benefitting Transit Agencies (cont.)

- \$1.1 billion for the Clean California Program
  - \$296 million is for projects on local streets and roads, tribal land, parks, pathways and rail and transit centers.
- \$600 million for Planning and Implementation Grants for Infill/Strategies to Reduce VMT
- \$10 million for UC ITS

### Investments Returned to General Fund

- \$2.5 billion for the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program
  - Note: TIRCP retains \$500M-\$600M from GGRF and SB 1
- \$500 million for the Active Transportation Program
- \$400 million for Climate Adaptation on Transportation Infrastructure
- No Action on Funding for HSR

## Funding Milestones

#### **TIRCP**

- November 10: Comments on Draft Guidelines Due
- November 19: Call for Projects
- March 3: Project Applications Due

#### **HVIP**

- Q4 2021: \$60 million made available
- Q1 2022: Remaining \$279.5 million made available

#### Clean California

- December 1: Call for Projects\*\*
- February 1: Project Application Deadline\*\*

#### CEC Clean Transportation Program

Q1 2022: Unknown funding level made available

## AB 476 (Mullin) Part-Time Transit Lanes

- Sponsored by the Association
- Expands bus on shoulder authorization statewide
  - Recasts BOS as the more descriptive "part-time transit lanes"
- Status: Two-Year Bill; Amended 9/7

## AB 917 (Bloom) Parking Enforcement

- Co-Sponsored by the Association (with LA Metro and AC Transit)
- Further authorizes transit agencies to use camera technology to discourage illegal parking in transit-only lanes and at transit stops
- Status: Signed by Governor Newsom

# SB 44 (Allen) CEQA: Environmental Leadership Transit Projects

- Supported by the Association
- Streamlines judicial review of transit projects in LA County subject to CEQA-based litigation
- Status: Signed by Governor Newsom

# SB 674 (Durazo) Public Contracts: Workforce Development

- Concerns raised by the Association and CALACT
- Aims to support the creation and retention of quality, non-temporary and full-time jobs through transportation-related public contracts
- Status: Two-Year Bill; Senator Durazo to convene impacted stakeholders

## CALACT – Other Legislation

- AB 43 (Friedman) Traffic Safety
  - Position: Support
  - Status: Signed by Governor Newsom
- AB 361 (Rivas) Open Meetings: State and Local Agencies: Teleconferences
  - Position: Watch
  - Status: Signed by Governor Newsom

## Association – Other Legislation

- AB 1157 (Lee) Controller: Transportation Funds: Distribution and Reporting Requirements
  - Position: Support
  - Status: Signed by Governor Newsom
- AB 1260 (Chen) CEQA: Exemptions: Transportation-Related Projects
  - Position: Support
  - Status: Held in Senate Appropriations Committee
- SB 339 (Wiener) Vehicles: Road Usage Charge Pilot Program
  - Position: Support
  - Status: Signed by Governor Newsom




